## The Abaca String Band

The Abaca String Band has been presenting music education programs in the New York City public schools under the auspices of the Carnegie Hall Education Department since 1996. The group has also conducted music workshops and lecture/demonstrations in many other schools, from Elementary to University level, during this time.

The instrumentation of the **Abaca String Band** makes it particularly suitable for demonstrating the repertoire and history of stringed instruments; the guitar, mandolin, violin, viola, and double bass encompass the three basic types of stringed instrument: plucked (guitar), bowed (violin, viola, double bass), and plectrum (mandolin).

Programs include a basic 45, 60 or 90 minute lecture/demonstration illustrating the history of stringed instruments and repertoire. Specially structured programs are also available - "European Music from 1700", "American Music from 1750", "Arrangements and Transcriptions", etc.

The needs of the particular school are always addressed.

Interaction with students and faculty is an integral part of every presentation.
